

an annual province-wide assessment of all B.C. students' academic skills in grades 4 and 7. The results provide parents, teachers, schools, school districts and the Ministry of Education with important information on how well students are progressing in the foundation skills of Literacy and Numeracy.

During the last two weeks of October, our grade 4 and 7 students have been writing these assessments.

Many of the questions are multiple choice and involve writing in a booklet and/or online. It is stressed that this is a Provincial assessment and does not impact the individual report cards that are written by teachers.
